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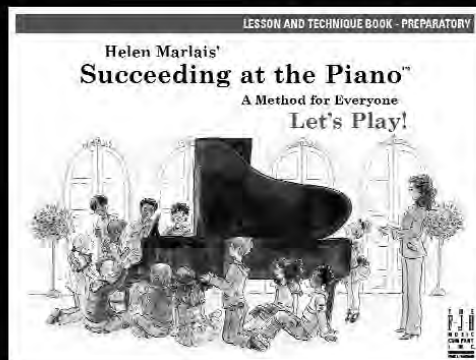

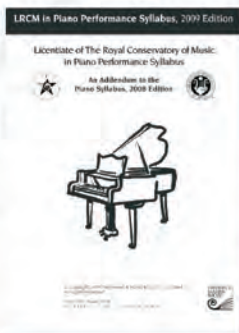
NEW THEORY SYLLABUS, 2009 EDITION

A Convention Session Proposals

As part of the planning for the 2011 CFMTA Convention, we are inviting interested teachers and composers to put forth a proposal on a topic they would like to present in keeping with the theme of this convention, ***"Music is a Life Force"***.

- 1) **GENERAL SESSIONS** – Teachers are invited to submit proposals on workshop sessions they feel would be of interest and relevance to primarily private studio teachers in various disciplines – piano, voice, strings, etc.
- 2) **CANADIAN COMPOSER SESSIONS** – Canadian composers are invited to participate in the special *Canadian Composers' Day*, July 7th. There will be opportunities for presenting workshops for delegates and/or young student composers, for showcasing compositions in mini recitals, and for displaying in the trade show.

Proposals should not be commercial in nature. The convention committee will choose from the submitted proposals and preference will be given to those with pedagogical value, and also those that offer a significant music making component on the part of the presenter and/or involvement of the delegates. Sessions are generally 60 to 90 minutes in length.

B Poster Session Proposals

The convention will provide an opportunity for the presentation of posters that present pedagogical ideas in a condensed way, geared to the visual learner.

These posters should be based on studio/pedagogy projects that demonstrate interesting and creative ways of teaching music skills such as harmonization, sight playing, composition, music history, theory, or any other practical information, at any level.

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The Canadian Federation of Music Teachers' Associations History 1935 to 2009

THE EARLY YEARS OF CFMTA

The Canadian Federation of Music Teachers' Associations official birth as an organization took place on August 24, 1935 when delegates of the provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia traveled to Vancouver, BC to gather in Harmony Hall. This meeting was the result of the vision of Minnie Boyd of Winnipeg, MB and Roy Robertson of Vancouver, BC who enlisted the interest of the presidents of the other Western provinces. The founding group of music teachers who met that morning to create to our national organization were:

Much was accomplished at this first meeting. The newly formed group was named "The Canadian Federation of Music Teachers' Associations" (CFMTA)

THE EARLY YEARS OF CFMTA continued

Two representatives from each province were appointed for the purpose of voting. Discussion was held regarding the general objectives for the new association: to strengthen the work of the provincial organizations, to have music teaching properly recognized as education, to secure registration for qualified music teachers and to “make Canada musical”.

On August 26th, 1935, a second meeting was held at which a framework for bylaws governing the organization and a constitutional outline were drawn up. These were presented and passed at the Executive Council meeting on July 16th, 1936.

The first convention was held at the Hotel Georgia in Vancouver in 1936 with 114 in attendance, representing teachers from the four western provinces. It was four days in length. Delegates expressed the need for a federation newsletter. “The Canadian Music Teacher” Vol. 1 #1 was published in January, 1937. The first editor was Reginald Cox of Victoria, BC.

The second convention of The Canadian Federation of Music Teachers' Associations was held at the Fort Garry Hotel in Winnipeg in 1937. It was decided to have biennial conventions with Saskatoon, SK hosting the convention in 1939 and Victoria, BC hosting in 1941.

1942 was an important year for CFMTA when Ontario became the first province to join the four original provinces. In 1944, Nova Scotia was the next province to join and in 1945, our organization welcomed Quebec as the newest member.

Also, in 1942, the Young Artist Tour was inaugurated with three recitals in Saskatchewan and Manitoba. This program was initiated by well-known Saskatoon teacher Lyell Gustin. By 1945, all four western provinces sponsored Young Artist tours. In 1959, Ontario joined the Young Artist Program, followed by the Maritimes in 1960.



World War Two forced the suspension of national conventions until 1946. Although they did not meet for biennial conventions, the work of CFMTA/FCAPM was carried on by its dedicated and visionary founders.

The CFMTA/FCAPM showed their support of Canadian composers with a program called "Composer's Division". There was much encouragement for teachers to use Canadian music in their studios and recitals. In 1946, a comprehensive list of Canadian composers and their works was published and distributed throughout Canada, as well as in other countries. It was a very well-received project. In 1960, on the 25th Anniversary of CFMTA/FCAPM, a prize was awarded for the best composition of a chamber work by a Canadian composer. The winner of this award was Maurice Dela of Quebec, a well respected and well known composer.

To celebrate the 25th Anniversary of CFMTA/FCAPM, the first "Canada Music Week®" was held in November, 1960. It was such a success that it became an annual event and one of our most important programs to the present time. Celebrated in November to coincide with St. Cecilia Day, it gives us the opportunity to promote Canadian music in our communities across Canada.



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THE NEXT TWENTY-FIVE YEARS (1960 to 1985)

As CFMTA/FCAPM grew in age, our organization also grew in membership and stature, well beyond the hopes and imaginations of those who began with a vision twenty-five years before. Eight provinces were now members of the federation. The CFMTA/FCAPM seal was placed on the Bill of Incorporation on March 9th, 1961. In 1965, during the presidency of Robert Pounder, it was decided that our federation needed a permanent position for Secretary-Treasurer to serve with continuity for new presidents that were elected bi-annually. The first Secretary-Treasurer was Doris Phillips who served our organization for many years.

The Canadian Federation of Music Teachers' Associations continued to be at the forefront of promotion of musical education in Canada. President Flora Goulden represented CFMTA/FCAPM as Research on Education Chairman for more than twenty years and kept our membership informed of all aspects of musical education; in particular, in the schools, colleges and universities. In turn, CFMTA/FCAPM contributed to music awareness throughout Canada. We supported festivals and competitions, worked with the Canada Council for the Performing Arts and Provincial Arts Councils to bring attention to worthy musical endeavours throughout urban centers and rural communities and worked for increased musical education in our school systems.

Canada Music Week[®] continued to expand under the enthusiastic chairmanship of Helen Dahlstrom. With the advent of the Canada Music Week[®] Manuscript Competition in 1971, students aged eleven to nineteen were encouraged to compose. The music writing competition for young composers became an annual Canada Music Week[®] event.

For their 40th Anniversary, the CFMTA/FCAPM delegates gathered in Banff, AB for a memorable celebration of this milestone in their history and all the contributions of our organization that enhanced the musical landscape of Canada.

In 1985, a very special convention was held to honour the 50th Anniversary of The Canadian Federation of Music Teachers' Associations. The delegates once again gathered in Vancouver, the same city where the organization was born fifty years earlier. The event was celebrated with a National Concerto Competition. All provinces held auditions. Five pianists, three violinists, one violist and two cellists competed in this exhilarating event. The overall winner was John Friesen of British Columbia. What was most impressive was the overall level of excellence of all of the provincial representatives, an indication of the high standard of teaching of our members all across Canada.

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FIFTY YEARS AND GOING STRONG (1985 to 2010)

In 1987, CFMTA/FCAPM welcomed Newfoundland as the ninth province to join the association. The first president of Newfoundland, Cavell Sheppard, invited the provincial council representatives to Newfoundland for the 1998 Vice-President's Meeting.

After the amazing enthusiasm and excitement of the 50th Anniversary Concerto Competition in Vancouver in 1985, it was decided to make the National Competition a biennial event to coincide with National Conventions. In 1988, at the Executive Meeting in St. John's, Newfoundland, the Vice-Presidents to CFMTA/FCAPM voted to have the Special Project for the 1989 Convention in Edmonton in the format of a National Piano Competition. Subsequent conventions have all benefitted from the excitement and musical excellence that the National Piano Competitions have generated.

As the organization grew, there was a need to revise the bylaws. In 1988, our new bylaws were approved by the Government of Canada. New bylaw booklets were distributed to all members in 1989. For the first time, a Board Manual was developed to apprise all Board Members of their responsibilities. Public relations were a high priority for our organization, with Hugheen Ferguson and Edith Morgenson delivering their Special Public Relations Report.

The national magazine had undergone several name changes, but in 1990, the name "The Canadian Music Teacher" was officially reinstated. In 1994, the format was changed to an appealing magazine style. Our magazine continues to be a most important communication tool for our members across Canada.

In 1991, Doris Phillips, who served as our national Secretary-Treasurer since 1967, retired and Beryl Wiebe was subsequently elected to the position.

The 60th Anniversary was celebrated at the Saskatoon Convention in 1995. It was an exciting musical event, with Sheila Shinkewski and her committee hosting the convention and the CFMTA/FCAPM Council sponsoring the 60th Anniversary events. The CFMTA/FCAPM pins were reinstated and we celebrated the diamond jubilee of our organization with a History Booklet, covering the years 1985 to 1995. Carol Shinkewski of British Columbia co-ordinated the updated history of the national and provincial organizations and the booklet was distributed to the membership.

In July of 1995, Prince Edward Island joined The Canadian Federation of Music Teachers' Associations, giving our organization representation in all ten provinces in Canada. We were now truly national, stretching sea to sea. Prince Edward Island welcomed members to the Executive Meeting in Charlottetown in 1996.

The members of CFMTA/FCAPM were saddened by the death of our Honorary National President, Robert Pounder (1913-1996), who had served since 1975.

Virginia Heinrichs of Manitoba was elected president in 1996. Piano Six, a project which brought six of Canada's elite pianists to perform for those in rural Canada, was an important addition to the musical landscape.

The Diamond Jubilee Collection, completed in 1997, was a tremendous success. More than 200 compositions, representing 61 different composers, were submitted to this 60th anniversary project. A collection of piano pieces by Canadian composers was then chosen and compiled by Hughleen Ferguson and made available to teachers across Canada. A CD of the collection by Valery Lloyd-Watts and a Teacher's Guide, with comments on each piece and composers' biographies, was added for the benefit of all teachers.

In 1997, Montreal hosted the national convention, with guest clinician Raoul Soso and the American Piano Quartet. This convention featured the "Della Pergola Voice Competition" as well as the National Piano Competition.

In 1998, Hughleen Ferguson of Ontario was elected as National President. It was an exciting time as our first website was introduced to our members across Canada. We were also introduced to the new Canada Music Week® logo. Our national archivist, Carol Mellors of Alberta, was instrumental in having our archival files moved to the National Library in Ottawa.

Winnipeg hosted the 1999 convention "Music, the Next Millennium" with guest clinicians, pianist Jon Kimura Parker, violinist David Stewart and vocalist Henriette Schellenberg. The convention featured the 1999 Convention String Competition as well as the National Piano Competition. We were proud to elect Helen Dahlstrom of Rossland, BC as our Honorary National President. Helen's contributions to CFMTA/FCAPM have had a lasting impact on our association.

The Marek Jablonski Prize for Chopin Endowment was initiated as an ongoing tribute to his outstanding musical inspiration. Jon Kimura Parker gave a concert in Edmonton to benefit this newly established fund. The creation of this fund, which contributes the Chopin Award presented at our National Piano Competition, was spearheaded by the Alberta Registered Music Teachers' Association.

Our national magazine "The Canadian Music Teacher" kept teachers across Canada in touch with the national developments, notable musical events across Canada and contained numerous excellent articles on a variety of pedagogical topics. In 1999, national editor Susan Wilson added a third "Canada Music Week®" edition to the winter and summer publications. In 2001, Lore Ruschensky became the new editor of "The Canadian Music Teacher".

In 2000, Marilyn King of Saskatchewan was elected President of CFMTA/FCAPM. The National Memorial Pedagogy Award of \$500.00 was introduced and presented for the first time. In sync with the changing times, a new category for Electro-acoustic Music was added to the Canada Music Week® Music Writing Awards. Our organization was gaining recognition on the international scene. When ISME came to Edmonton in 2000, we hosted a reception for guests from around the world.

“2001- A Musical Odyssey” was held in Kelowna, BC. Pianist Lila Gailling was presented in concert and gave master classes. The 2001 National Piano Competition featured a commissioned work by BC composer Steven Ho, which was performed as part of each competitor's program. In a beautiful setting on Lake Okanagan, the attendees enjoyed a variety of workshops, entertainment and an excellent National Piano Competition.

With newly installed President Barbara Clarke of Newfoundland at the helm, the 2002 Annual Executive and Annual General Meetings were held in Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island. In this historical setting, where the forefathers of Canada met to confederate, our representatives discussed issues of national importance. The Trademark Office of Canada officially approved the Canada Music Week[®] tm to proceed to publication. The National Piano Competition Awards were raised to \$5000.00 for first place, \$3000.00 for second place and \$2000.00 for third place.

Our members went to the east coast for the 2003 convention. “Come to the Sea in 2003” attracted teachers from across Canada to St. John's, Newfoundland. A special feature of this superb musical event was the collaboration with “Festival 500 Sharing of Voices”, an internationally renowned choral festival. Clinicians included Angela Cheng, Dr. Edmond Dawe and Dr. Jill Dawe. Once again, the calibre of performance in the CFMTA FCAPM National Piano Competition showed the excellence of our Canadian pianists.

In 2003, plans for a Collaborative Conference with MTNA and RCM were formulated. Victoria Warwick of Ontario, newly elected national President and Patricia Frehlich of Alberta, newly elected national Vice-President, became part of the steering committee for this memorable event.

We were off to Calgary for our 2005 Convention “Peak Performance”. What a great week we had, celebrating wonderful musical events amid the hoopla of the world renowned Calgary Stampede. Our featured clinicians were Seymour Bernstein, piano and Tracy Dahl, soprano. Numerous other workshops rounded out the five-day conference. The three competitions, the National Piano Competition, the Rozsa Foundation Voice Competition and the Amour Competition, for voice and piano, gave us many memorable performances.

At the Annual General Meeting, discussions were held on unifying membership requirements across Canada. A Private Member's Bill allowing tuition tax credits for music instruction reached second reading in the House of Commons. The Helen Dahlstrom Music Writing Award was set up in honour of the contributions that our Honorary National President has made to our organization. In 2007, the vision of sharing a national convention with the Music Teacher's National Association of the United States became a reality. The dream began nine years previously, when Dr. Gary Ingle, Executive Director of MTNA, and Hugheen Ferguson, President of CFMTA/FCAPM, discussed the possibility of a Collaborative Conference. In the ensuing years, meetings between MTNA, RCM and CFMTA/FCAPM and their representatives on the steering committee planned a musical collaboration historically unprecedented. Our representatives, Victoria Warwick and Patricia Frehlich, worked tirelessly on planning this innovative event. On March 23, 2007, hundreds of music educators from Canada and the United States attended the opening ceremonies of the Collaborative Conference in Toronto. For the MTNA membership, it would be the first time in their one hundred year history that they travelled outside the USA for their annual convention. For the many members of CFMTA/FCAPM who travelled to Toronto, it was a once in a lifetime musical event with world class performers and clinicians, over sixty presentations, workshops, master classes and inspiring concerts.

Bernadette Bullock was elected to the position of Secretary-Treasurer. Since assuming the position in 2006, she has organized a data base for all of our CFMTA/FCAPM files, developed and managed our new website and archived many of our previous magazines and files. At the 2007 Annual General Meeting, a Special Resolution was passed proposing new membership categories with unified qualifications of membership across Canada. The proposed membership categories are: Registered Music Teacher (RMT designation), Affiliate Member Level 1, Affiliate Member Level 2 and Auxiliary Member.

In 2008, Peggy L'Hoir of Saskatchewan became the National President of our organization. Once again, CFMTA/FCAPM had their new Bylaws and Standing Rules ratified. The Bylaws, as well as a new Policy and Procedure Manual, were the work of National Bylaws Chairman Lynne Carmichael and her committee. Two new awards were initiated: the Bill Andrews Award presented to two branches for innovative Canada Music Week® projects and the Hugheen Ferguson Distinguished Teacher's Award, presented to outstanding teachers from across Canada, as chosen by their peers.

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History of the Young Artist Tour

The Young Artist Series, a CFMTA initiative since 1942, has given over 250 young musicians the exhilarating opportunity to be a touring artist, as well as bringing a high standard of performance to many communities across Canada.

The humble dream became a reality when Winnipeg's Myrtle Ruttan Patterson and Saskatoon's Dr. Lyell Gustin arranged concerts for their students in one another's communities. The two excellent concerts given by Saskatchewan's Neil Chotem and Manitoba's Gordon Kushner and James Duncan were well received and Dr. Gustin then made a proposal to the CFMTA resulting in the inauguration of the Young Artist Series in 1942, a tour of three recitals in Saskatchewan and Manitoba.

By 1945, the Young Artist Series expanded to the four Western Provinces, later diminishing to only Saskatchewan and Manitoba. With the financial, administrative and organizational support of the CFMTA, the Young Artist Series continued to provide a life changing opportunity for young musicians.

In 1957 the Young Artist Series received a generous endowment from its founder, Dr. Lyell Gustin, enabling an honorarium for the touring performers.

Western Young Artists Andrew Dawes and Douglas Voice were heard in seven Ontario communities in the spring of 1959. That fall, two Eastern Young Artists, Elaine Keillor and Merna Jenkin performed for twenty-three communities.

In 1960, the Young Artist Series expanded to the Eastern Provinces, but later withdrew, recommencing in 1985.

2004 was a year of reflection and financial review for this worthwhile program, resulting in the motion that the Young Artist Series would be held in non-convention years. ORMTA wished to host a tour yearly and since 2004 has paid for the tour every other year with their provincial funds.

A year of celebration and growth happened in 2008 with the of Young Artist Series expanding to Alberta and British Columbia, each hosting a tour in their province. We look forward to Quebec hosting a tour in the near future, making this a truly a national program

Biennially more than twenty-five communities across Canada have the privilege to hear these emerging artists, many of whom go onto concert careers. This program provides an exciting educational opportunity for students, teachers and communities as well as an unique opportunity for the performer.

The Young Artist Series is a result of the vision, dedication and tenacity of the many whom have been tireless in their efforts to keep this program going and growing!

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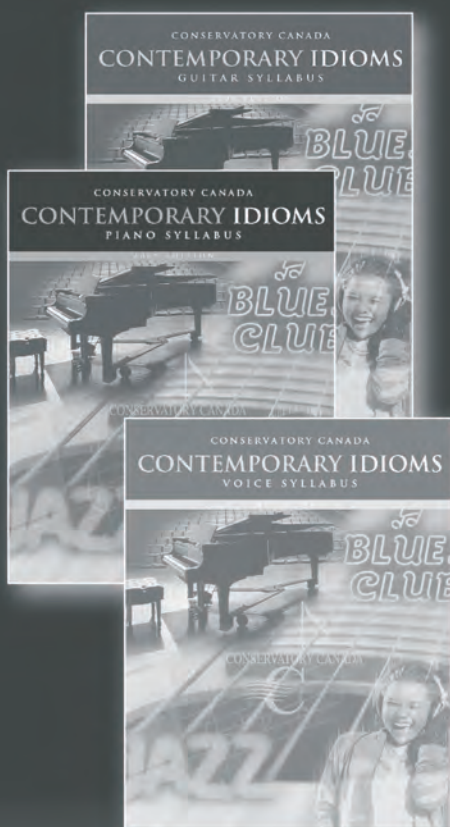
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History of Canada Music Week®

Canada Music Week® is an annual nation-wide festival sponsored by the Canadian Federation of Music Teachers' Associations (CFMTA) to introduce and stimulate a keener appreciation of Canadian music to students, teachers, and audiences; to encourage and promote Canadian composers and performers; and to emphasize the significance of music in society.

In 1957, Violet Isfeld, who was then CFMTA President, proposed that a national week for music be initiated in 1960, to commemorate the 25th Anniversary of the CFMTA and to involve the entire Federation at every level. The response from the inaugural event was enthusiastic and the celebration was so successful, that the next year it was decided by the CFMTA Council to make Canada Music Week® an annual event.

In 1963, Reginald Bedford, President, suggested the setting-up of a committee with a Convenor for Canada Music Week®. Sister M. Rodriguez Steel (Nova Scotia) and Eleanor Patch (British Columbia) were appointed as Co-Convenors. (Arthur Putland succeeded Eleanor Patch in 1969). It was also decided at the same time, that Canada Music Week® be observed in the last full week of November to coincide with St. Cecilia's Day (the Patron Saint of Music), thereby giving church musicians the opportunity to contribute to the special week. Canada Music Week® has been become a regular event since 1969.

In 1969, Flora Goulden, President, wrote to each Provincial Premier to ask for their initial interest and co-operation through their Ministers of Education and thence to their schools. To achieve greater national unity in the observance of Canada Music Week®, a poster competition was under-taken on an annual basis with popular support.

The Canada Music Week® Committee has nine provincial and other branch chairpersons and a national chairperson. During Canada Music Week®, special events and programs take place in each community under the responsibility of individual centers throughout Canada. For some years the directors of Canada Music Week® were chosen by the CFMTA Council. Now each province is autonomous in its programming.

A number of exceptional national chairpersons have dedicated their efforts to the growth and development of Canada Music Week® over the years. Helen Dahlstrom became the third national chairperson of Canada Music Week® in 1969 to 1992 followed by Penny Joynt, 1993 - 1998, Lore Rushiensky, 1999 - 2000, Ron Spadafore 2001 - 2007 and Po Yeh 2008 - . Helen Dahlstrom was named Honorary President of CFMTA at the 1999 convention and acknowledged for her accomplishments on behalf of Canada Music Week®.

The Canada Music Week® committee publishes a newsletter (since 1959 but regularly since 1969) with suggestions for activities and promotional material and administers the national Music Writing Competition to stimulate interest in music composing among young Canadian musicians.

History of Canada Music Week[®]

In 2001 under the direction of Lore Ruschensky, the Canada Music Week[®] newsletter became a regular edition of The Canadian Music Teacher (CMT), making three editions of the CMT per year.

The logo for Canada Music Week[®] from 1961 to 2005 was the image of the dynamic Sir Ernest MacMillan in action, conducting. This logo was used on all posters and special Canada Music Week[®] newsletters. Sir Ernest MacMillan (1893-1973) conductor of the Toronto Symphony Orchestra, was constantly traveling throughout the length and breadth of our country, guest conducting, examining, adjudicating young music students and championing musical causes at the local, regional and national level. He was a familiar and much loved musician.

Canada Music Week[®] is dedicated to music in its fullest sense, but since 1967, particular stress has been focused on the Canadian cultural content. A highlight was the performance of Four Winnipeg Original Compositions heard in concert at the CFMTA Convention in Halifax in July 1973. This special event was the result of a general invitation for all composers to compete, whether they are professional or amateur. The result was that manuscripts were submitted from Canada, Czechoslovakia, Belgium, France, Norway, England, Scotland and Ireland.

The Canada Music Week[®] Music Writing Competition was introduced in 1971, offering classes at different age levels. This is open to all students of members of CFMTA and aims to stimulate young people in the art of composition.

In commemoration of the 25th anniversary of Canada Music Week[®] and the 50th anniversary of CFMTA, the CFMTA and Waterloo Music Co published in 1985 the Diamond Jubilee Collection, a book of piano solos by Canadian composers. This edition was the result of a juried competition.

CFMTA MEMORIAL DONATIONS

History of Canada Music Week®

To quote Helen Dahlstrom, National Chairman:

"This volume has been planned and prepared to give students and teachers the opportunity to expand their Canadian contemporary repertoire. It is also intended to be a miniature showcase of the music of Canadian composers. The pieces have been carefully selected with regard to their educational value, and are arranged in order of difficulty from beginner to advanced levels. The music was chosen by a panel of judges from submissions from all parts of Canada. It should prove useful for teaching and performing purposes, as well as festival and examination requirements."

The Diamond Jubilee Collection features 29 compositions by selected composer-members of CFMTA, a valuable resource of Canadian music for piano to give teachers and students an opportunity to expand their Canadian repertoire. The Teachers' Guide to the Diamond Jubilee Collection, written by Hugheen Ferguson and Valerie Lloyd Watts, was published in 1998, containing brief composer biographies, background "musical interest" information, as well as suggestions regarding interpretation and technical points about the pieces. There is also an accompanying CD presenting the pieces of the Diamond Jubilee Collection performed by Valerie Lloyd Watts.

In 1999 the new electronic music category for Canada Music Week® Music Writing Competition was introduced for all age categories. This competition category was temporarily discontinued in 2001 for review by an expert knowledgeable in the genre, and reinstated for the 2003 competition year. Since 2006 Roland Canada has presented the award for this category.

The Music Writing Competition awards were expanded in 2008 to include a new category for participants age eight and under. In 2009 Fairchild Radio became a sponsor of the Music Writing Competition, providing a total of \$2,000 in prizes, in eight categories. In recognition of the generous support by Calgary Fairchild Radio, the prizes were renamed the Fairchild Radio Awards. In 2010, Fairchild Radio will be providing additional support for the recording and on-air promotion of Music Writing Competition winners.

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History of Canada Music Week®

Judges for the Music Writing Competition over the years have included many notable Canadian composers and musicians: Violet Archer, Robert Fleming, Godfrey Ridout, Jean Papineau-Couture, Talivaldis Kenins, Keith Bissell, Brian Cherney, Walter Buczynski, Ruth Watson Henderson, Nancy Telfer, Mavid McIntyre, David Dahlgren, Derek Stoll, Robert Lemay, Maya Badian, Francis Balodis, Joanne Bender and Kristin Flores.

In 2006 the Canada Music Week® Revitalization Committee was formed with the aim of using Canada Music Week® as a vehicle to increase the unified professional profile of the CFMTA membership. Committee members included: Ron Spadafore, Joan Woodrow, Darlene Brigidear, Gregory Chase and Doranne Cooper.

An initiative of this committee was the introduction of the Call for Compositions for piano and vocal compositions in 2006, which resulted in 50 compositions submitted from across Canada. Two compositions were published on the CFMTA website for use in the 2007 Canada Music Week® celebrations, with performances encouraged during Canada Music Week®. As a result of the success of the Call for Compositions again in 2008, it became an annual event in 2009.

In 2007, the Helen Dahlstrom award in the Canada Music Week Music Writing Competition was initiated, to be given at the discretion of the adjudicator for the best national composition as selected by the jury.

The Bill Andrews Canada Music Week Awards were introduced in 2008. Two awards of \$250 each are awarded to selected branches to support Canada Music Week events or projects. The awards are made possible by the generous annual donation of Bill Andrews of Toronto.

This year, 2010, marks the 50th year of the national celebration of Canada Music Week®. Canada Music Week® activity has now become a positive experience for thousands of Canadians, young and old and is highlighted in radio and television coverage, press and magazines. Canada Music Week® publicity materials are available in the form of seals, posters, buttons and pencils, which have continually increased in demand since their introduction. Libraries, schools, post-secondary institutions, concert societies, orchestras, choirs, church musicians, along with studio teachers and their students, are all uniting in the ever-expanding promotion of Canada Music Week®. Our music is our culture and our heritage. This is the direct result of a tremendous effort put forth by the members of CFMTA who have responded to the challenge with enthusiasm, and have created an air of musical awareness and festivity throughout the country.

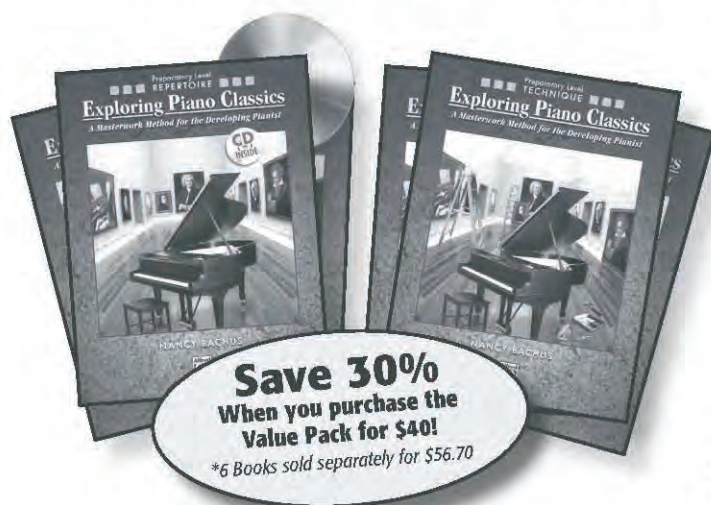
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History of Special Projects

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QUEBEC REGISTERED MUSIC TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION HISTORY

History from 1942 to 1995

While reviewing the archives of the late Rose Goldblatt, past president of the QMTA, I came across a small newspaper clipping from 1945 with the heading "Music Teachers Hold Annual Meeting". Rose Goldblatt and Violet Archer's names were listed as attendees at the meeting. The QMTA was founded in 1942, formally incorporated in 1944, and joined the CFMTA in 1945. Our first executives, Edna-Marie Hawkin and Marie-Thérèse Paquin were elected national president and treasurer respectively in 1946 and remained in office until 1951.

The QMTA founders began a series of winter and spring meetings that attracted outstanding musicians and speakers from Canada and parts of North America and Europe. Festivals, clubs and student recitals followed later. The primary aim of QMTA's first and bilingual constitution was to "work toward a closer understanding between the French and English through co-operative endeavours in the art of music". Our current constitution states, "We are a cultural non-profit organization of certified teachers whose primary aim is to organize activities which will promote cultural exchanges."

History from 1995 to 2010

Our organization consists primarily of piano teachers, but some of us also teach orchestra and band instruments as well as theory and pedagogy. Some teach privately and others are affiliated with music schools. Over the years, thanks to the Quebec Immigration Department's policies, we are proud to have added teachers of different nationalities representing many countries.

It is a broadening experience that benefits all our teachers and their students.

Regular Activities

Canada Music Week[®] consists of a day of student recitals followed by a gala concert and reception in the following week. The best students are selected to play at this gala recital to which are invited composers, distinguished guests and the family and friends of the students. Over the years Christiane Claude and others were responsible for this event. Currently Méline Claude is in charge.

The Montreal Classical Music Festival replaced our Spring Festival (founded in 1991) when it was taken over by the QMTA under the leadership of past president Yolande Gaudreau, later joined by David Côté. Between 300 and 400 students compete for prizes in the following categories: piano, string, wind, voice and composition. The trophy winners perform two weeks later at a concert open to the public.

The Spring Recital, a non-competitive event, allows students to perform in public without competing.

Clubs

The Beginner and Intermediate Adult Performance Club and the Advanced Adult Performance Club are those in which amateur students, who are over 18, perform in private homes in a friendly and supportive atmosphere. These clubs were founded by past-president Daphne Sandercock over 30 years ago. The popular Kids' Club is for 10-year olds and under who perform for Santa Claus in December at a concert hall.

Highlights

Guest musicians from Quebec : Marie-Nathalie Lacoursière led a workshop on Baroque dances. Composers Allan Crossman and Paul Frehner, both affiliated with CMC, each led a pilot project in composition. Paul Frehner was winner of the MSO's 2007 Claude Vivier National prize for best Canadian composition. Raymond Daveluy, renowned former organist/composer at the St. Joseph's Oratory in Montreal, gave an illustrated lecture on the organ. A lecture on sight reading was given by Michèle Royer, author of "Le clavier, méthode créative". The renowned teacher, Marc Durand, gave an illustrated lecture on piano technique.

Guest Musicians from Outside Quebec: Master classes were given by Anton Kuerti, international pianist and lecturer, Nelita True, American pianist and lecturer and Monique Déchaussée, French author, pianist and teacher. Lee Evans, American author of books on the introduction of jazz in the traditional piano lesson, gave an illustrated lecture.

Convention in Montreal in 1997

We were pleased to welcome our Canadian teachers to this convention which was under the responsibility of Rita Barg, President, now deceased. Monik Grenier was responsible for the Della Pergola singing competition.

Some Important Changes and Additions :

Gayle Colebrook transformed our Newsletter into a print and online journal called Musifax. At present, Danielle Langevin is Editor-in-Chief. The Quebec Musical Education Foundation (QMEF), founded by the late Rita Barg raises funds for higher education in music studies. Under this umbrella, Katharine Notkin founded the QMEF music Performathon in 1999 in collaboration with the QMTA and Pianos Prestige. Every other year the students find sponsors, perform at various venues and raise funds for music prizes that are awarded at the QMTA Montreal Classical Music Festival and other events.

Our Students, Our Raison d'être:

Our goal as music teachers is to promote a love of great music and encourage self-expression through music. Thus we strive towards excellence in interpretation and encourage musical composition.

The future of this music rests in the hands and voices of these young musicians.

Quebec students win national competitions: Four young Quebec pianists were first-prize winners out of eight consecutive national piano competitions. They were: Jean-François Latour (Saskatoon SK 1995), Jacynthe Riverin (Kelowna BC 2001), Isabelle Mathieu (St. John's NL 2003) and Isabelle David (Sackville NB 2009). Louise Marcotte (Quebec) won the first prize at the Della Pergola national vocal competition (Montreal QC 1997).

Selected students play Canadian compositions for CD: No history of the QMTA would be complete without mention of our double CD. The CD was made in collaboration with CMC (Quebec) and Guy Soucie of La chapelle historique du Bon-Pasteur in Montreal under the direction of past QMTA president Christiane Claude. I like to think of it as Quebec's offering to the teachers and students across Canada: a gift from us to you.

Space does not permit a list of all our dedicated and talented members or the many activities that they organize to make the QMTA such a success. L'ASSOCIATION DES PROFESSEURS DE MUSIQUE DU QUÉBEC HISTORIC

1942 – 1995

En examinant les archives de la regrettée *Rose Goldblatt*, ancienne présidente de l'APMQ, j'ai trouvé un article de journal daté de 1945, portant le titre : « Music Teachers Hold Annual Meeting » (des professeurs de musique tiennent leur réunion annuelle). *Rose Goldblatt* et *Violet Archer* sont nommées en tant que participantes à cette réunion. L'APMQ fondée en 1942, incorporée en 1944, s'est jointe à la FCAPM en 1945. *Edna-Marie Hawkin* et *Marie-Thérèse Paquin* ont été élues respectivement présidente et trésorière en 1946. Elles ont occupé ces fonctions jusqu'en 1951.

Les fondateurs de l'APMQ organisaient des séries de rencontres où ils invitaient des musiciens et conférenciers de grande réputation venant du Canada, d'Amérique du Nord et d'Europe. Les Festivals, Clubs et Récitals d'élèves sont venus plus tard. Le premier texte de Constitution de l'APMQ, bilingue, donne comme but premier de l'association une meilleure compréhension entre francophones et anglophones, par la pratique de la musique. Selon la Constitution actuelle, nous sommes une organisation sans but lucratif, regroupant des professeurs de musique diplômés qui mettent sur pied des activités favorisant, entre autres, les échanges culturels.

1995 – 2010

Parmi nous, il se parle maintenant vingt langues différentes ! Nos membres sont en majorité des professeurs de piano. Certains enseignent aussi des instruments d'orchestre, la théorie, la culture auditive et la pédagogie. Ces professeurs enseignent en privé, ou sont affiliés à différentes écoles de musique.

Activités régulières

Nous célébrons la « *Semaine de la musique canadienne* » par une journée complète de récitals d'élèves, suivie d'un récital-gala avec réception la semaine suivante. Les meilleurs élèves sont choisis pour jouer lors de ce récital-gala auquel sont invités des compositeurs, des personnalités, les familles et amis des élèves. Pendant plusieurs années, Christiane Claude a été responsable de cet événement. Notre Festival du printemps (établi en 1991) a cédé sa place au Festival de musique classique de Montréal lorsque l'APMQ a pris la responsabilité de cet événement de plus grande envergure sous la direction de *Yolande Gaudreau*, ancienne présidente, et plus tard, *David Côté*. De 300 à 400 étudiants en piano, cordes, vents, voix ou composition participent à ce concours. Les gagnants de trophées (âgés de 7 à 20 ans) ont l'occasion de se produire lors d'un concert ouvert au public, deux semaines plus tard. Le Récital du printemps, activité non compétitive, permet aux élèves de jouer en public sans concourir.

Des musiciens amateurs adultes (18 ans ou plus), élèves de nos membres, se réunissent dans des maisons privées ou centres d'accueil, se produisant ainsi dans une atmosphère amicale. Ce sont les Clubs d'adultes initiés par *Daphne Sandercock*, ancienne présidente, il y a plus de 30 ans. Le Club des petits (10 ans et moins) offre un concert au Père Noël en décembre.

chacun un projet pilote en composition. *Frehner* a gagné le prix Claude Vivier OSM 2007 pour la meilleure composition canadienne. *Raymond Daveluy*, organiste, compositeur de grande réputation et organiste titulaire de l'oratoire Saint-Joseph pendant de nombreuses années, a donné une conférence avec démonstrations à l'orgue. *Michelle Royer*, auteur de « Le clavier : méthode créative, » a donné un atelier sur la lecture à vue. Le renommé *Marc Durand* a donné une conférence sur la technique pianistique.

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ONTARIO REGISTERED MUSIC TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION HISTORY

OMTA (Ontario Music Teachers Association) was formed in Toronto in 1936 to promote and maintain high music and academic qualifications among its members. In 1942, it became associated with the CFMTA, and in 1946, became incorporated as ORMTA. The original membership numbered 131, and by 1979, had grown to approximately 1200. That number has remained relatively static for the last thirty years.

ORMTA was divided into nine Zones, each with several branches, and a Zone Representative on Provincial Council. There are thirty-three branches in 2010 down from thirty-nine in 1983.

ORMTA is responsible for the acceptance of music as an accredited subject in Ontario Secondary Schools, whether the studies are in school or in a private studio

The leaflet "**THE PRIVATE MUSIC TEACHER AND THE SCHOOL ACT**" was printed, and sent to all members with extra copies available upon request.

Many projects that were undertaken are still in existence today; **Cora B. Ahrens Award** - given to a student of a Registered Music Teacher with the highest mark in a Pedagogy examination; **Young Artist Competition and Student Competition** - we now hold these competitions at Branch, Zone and Provincial levels, and at the Young Artist Level, a Tour is provided by ORMTA with financial support from CFMTA.

The **Workshop Program** has been an important part of ORMTA for many years. With generous financial help from Provincial Funds, Professional

Development is provided for ORMTA members on an annual basis. The importance of continued learning, updated teaching information, awareness of best teaching practices, and networking with other private music teachers, is both a privilege and a necessity of ORMTA membership. Teaching success depends on a Workshop Program for members.

For some years, ORMTA staffed a booth at the **Canadian National Exhibition**, with a lighted board showing all the branches, publications handed out, and recitals performed. While this is no longer done, ORMTA did work with the RCM in the summer of 2009 by providing a free lesson from an ORMTA teacher in many Ontario towns through a name draw process at the RCM booth at the CNE.

The inception of the **ORMTA NOTES** magazine in 1969 was, and continues to be, a valuable source of information to the members.

Over the years, many branches have helped organize Music Festivals, raised Scholarship Funds, and raised funds to provide grand pianos in their communities. The **ACNMP** (Alliance for Canadian New Music Projects) grew from the efforts of four Toronto teachers who formed a Contemporary Music Selection Committee. Annotated lists of Canadian music were published in 1968. This grew into the ACNMP with **non-competitive Contemporary Showcases** held in many locations across Canada every year.

In 1993, Ottawa hosted the CFMTA National Convention. Headliners at this convention were Angela Hewett, R. Murray Shafer, Stuart Hamilton, Jose Fernandez, Elaine Keillor, Andrew Tunis and John Partinton, the CFMTA

National Piano Competition and the Flora Matheson Goulden String Competition.

ONTARIO REGISTERED MUSIC TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION HISTORY

Under the leadership of dedicated Provincial Executive and Council, ORMTA has realized many **accomplishments** in the last decade.

We have established a **Provincial ORMTA website**, with links to most of our thirty-three branches, and to CFMTA. Members, as well as the general public, can access such information as our Bylaws, Workshops, Conventions, Competitions, Canada Music Week, Membership Information and Application Forms, and Contact Information for our NOTES magazine. Our website also provides links to CanadaHelps and to our ORMTA Page on Facebook. The website is very ably managed by former Provincial Council member Helga Morrison.

We recently acquired **Official Charitable Status**. This was accomplished with research and application by our Provincial Treasurer Nancy Dale.

While Judy Home served on Provincial Council and Executive, she was instrumental in having our **By-laws updated**.

Our **Pre-Diploma Status** has been updated to adapt to equalization with Membership Teaching Levels in other provinces, and to the new Pedagogy Levels introduced by the Royal Conservatory of Music. Our new **Affiliate Levels** invite teachers with Grade Nine Practical and Theory to join as **Affiliate Level II**, and Grade Ten Practical and Theory as **Affiliate Level I**. These teachers have several years to complete their Pedagogy and Practical Qualifications for Active membership, are mentored by Active members, and their progress is reported yearly to our Secretary-Registrar.

During the Presidency of Doranne Cooper-Minotti, we changed our January Provincial Council meeting in Toronto to an **Electronic Meeting**. This has resulted in considerable financial savings for our members, and has allowed our Council Members and Executive to avoid transportation difficulties during winter weather.

Those qualified in **Early Childhood Music, Jazz, and School Music** are now invited to apply for ORMTA membership.

An **ORMTA Facebook** site has been established by Council members Frank Horvat and Susan Jones. As previously mentioned, this site can be accessed on our Provincial website.

ORMTA has continued its history of outstanding leadership by **Presidents** in recent years.

ORMTA continues to sponsor many programs at the Provincial Level to benefit our teacher/members and their students. All of our **Council members maintain Portfolios**, as well as being **Representatives for their Zones**. Some of these Portfolios are: Provincial Workshops, By-laws, Competitions (Branch, Zone and Provincial), Fundraising, Membership, Canada Music Week, NOTES Advertising, Scholarships, and Special Teacher Awards.

ORMTA sponsors Provincial Competitions every year in July. Every other year, this event is enlarged into a four-day Provincial Convention, sponsored jointly by Provincial Council and a host Branch. Recent Conventions have been held in Timmins, Kitchener-Waterloo, Ottawa, and North Bay. In 2012, Hamilton-Halton Branch will host Provincial Convention. Our concentration, at present, is our **Provincial Convention, BRIDGING THE GAP in July, 2010** in London.

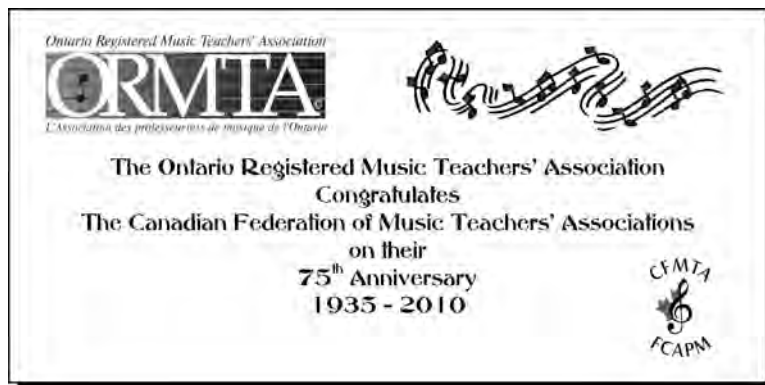

NEW BRUNSWICK REGISTERED MUSIC TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION HISTORY

In this 60th year of the NB Association, it is worth recording again the names of those who were active in calling the music teachers of the province together, initially, to speak with a more authoritative voice. Under the leadership of Alice Harrison, Moncton musicians Corey Smith, Ernest Freeborn, Hilda Hudson and Robin Bayley invited other New Brunswick teachers to join them in an organizational meeting, which was held in Moncton on October 21, 1950. Representatives came from Sackville (Howard Brown), Saint John (Muriel Thompson), Fredericton (James Manchip, David Howatt), Campbellton (Gladys MacDonald), Edmundston (Léo Paulin), St. Joseph's College at Memramcook (Father Léandre Brault) and St. Stephen (Donna Crompton). Following that meeting, a Constitution and By-Laws were devised by Alice Harrison and Ernest Freeborn in the name of the New Brunswick Music Teachers' Association. These were duly discussed and adopted at the first Annual Meeting in Moncton, Sept. 27, 1952.

A principal concern, in the early days of the Association, was with standards of music education. It may seem surprising in the 21st century to realize the extent to which private teachers expected to participate in and influence music curricula being developed within the Department of Education. For example, in 1962, NBRMTA recommended to the Department, a specific text (Rollinson) to be adopted for music matriculation. And, in 1966, a letter was sent to the Department, naming Tom Morrison of Fredericton as NBRMTA's liaison, should the Department wish to consult. Despite the high hopes and extensive work done, over the years, to have private music study accepted for High School

credit, there have been only two short periods when credit was granted – one in the 1950's, one in the 1990's. This continues to be a goal of NBRMTA.

Early affiliation with CFMTA led to encouragement to incorporate. This was accomplished in 1961. Later that same year, New Brunswick hosted the national biennial meeting and convention for the first time. Again, in 1983 and in 2009, CFMTA Conventions were hosted by NBRMTA. All three were held at Mount Allison University in Sackville. These have proven to be very successful and exciting events for provincial RMT's. N.B. has provided the national association with a president (Kathleen Fensom, 1979-1983), an Archivist (Elsa Noble, 1961-1979), and many active, long-standing Vice-Presidents and Delegates.

Over the last two decades, the Association has broadened its scope to include a Scholarship programme in memory of deceased RMT's, an annual prize/donation to the Provincial Music Festival and a Registered Music Teacher student competition within the province. These projects complement the CMW Music Writing Competition, the Atlantic Young Artist competition and tour, publication of a newsletter (started in 1965, now named *The Quarter Note*) and other ongoing activities.

Presidents of NBRMTA since 1995: Jane Bowden (1994-98), Sylvia Cormier (1998-2000), Gail Carleton (2000-04), Lynn Johnson (2004-07), Kilby Hume (2007-present).

The strength of NBRMTA has been its long-lived, long-serving members. Alice Harrison, who started the Association, lived to 102, remaining active into her

90's. She was the first Honourary Life Member, named in 1966. Charter member, Gladys MacDonald, attended every annual meeting/conference for 54 years, stopping the year before her death at age 92. She was NB Vice-President to CFMTA for many years and represented northern NB on the provincial council, off and on, for about 40 years. Corey Smith served as Secretary-Treasurer from 1950 to 1974 with the exception of one year in the 1960's. Hilda Shorten, Fredericton, acted as Registrar for 17 years (1966-1983). Among present-day members, Elizabeth Armour, Moncton, was President 1970-1973 and again in the '80's, then served as NB Vice-President and 1st Delegate to CFMTA for 10 years in the 1990's. A former President, Mabel Doak (1984-86), has been the Registrar since 1992. In 2009, she brought honour to all NB RMT's when she was awarded an Honourary Doctorate by St. Thomas University in Fredericton. Many others have left their mark and might well be characterized by the words of Patricia Elliott, speaking of Elsa Noble on the occasion of her Honourary Life Membership award: "I think of Elsa somewhat like a Bach Fugue. On a provincial level she has served as Council member, newsletter editor and President; on the national scene, as Vice-President from N.B and national Archivist. Her third voice or first, depending on your perspective, is within our local Branch"

Among activities in NB in recent years, many are associated with continuing education of teachers and Canada Music Week®. Moncton Music Teachers' Association celebrated its 60th anniversary in 2009. Saint John teachers have, on several occasions, prepared files on Canadian composers, which they distributed to RMT's and school music teachers. Moncton and Saint John local branches both inaugurated Contemporary Showcase Music Festivals in 2009. Fredericton teachers, in cooperation with local school districts, are bringing in Christopher Norton for a master class, recital/demo for school children and a workshop in 2010. Recitals have been organized for winning compositions submitted to the CMW competition, to be performed by their student composers during the NBRMTA annual conference.

An interesting reference to Canada Music Week® was found among archival materials. A newspaper article stated that Moncton organist, Ernest Freeborn, first suggested the idea of a nation-wide music week. "...Mr. Freeborn said he first tabled the proposal 10 years ago in Calgary when the CFMTA was meeting to celebrate its 25th year of existence. 'To make it even more effective', he remembered, 'I suggested a starting date of November 22nd, the day belonging to St. Cecilia...'". (Saturday Evening Post, Nov. 24, 1970) It's possible that Mr. Freeborn was referring to the decision to make Canada Music Week® an annual event, rather than the original idea of commemorating the 25th anniversary with a week of music.

Moving forward to 2010, NBRMTA is forging a partnership with a successful summer festival for winners of NBRMTA/CFMTA competitions to have performance opportunities. The Baie des Chaleurs International Chamber Music Festival featured the NB competitor at the CFMTA piano competition at its 13th annual festival in 2009. This is to be a continuing consideration for winners of any competition organized by NBRMTA.

NOVA SCOTIA REGISTERED MUSIC TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION HISTORY

The Nova Scotia Music Teachers' Association was founded August 27, 1937 and officially incorporated March 17, 1941. In August, 1944, the "Nova Scotia Registered Music Teachers' Association" became affiliated with the "Canadian Federation of Music Teachers' Association. The first Nova Scotia registered music teachers who served on the Executive of the CFMTA were Langston Miller, Harry Dean and Cyril O'Brien.

Then in August, 1951, the name of the organization was changed from the Nova Scotia Music Teachers' Association to the Nova Scotia Registered Music Teachers' Association.

1995

The Young Artists Competition moved from Mt. Allison University to Wolfville, NS. The tour to celebrate 60th year for CFMTA includes Newfoundland, PEI, New Brunswick, and Nova Scotia. The PEIRMT continues to submit news to our provincial news letter "Arabesque". A new logo for NSRMTA was approved.

Patron: His Honour, the Honourable J. James Kinley, Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia.

1996

NSRMTA Scholarship Competition designed pamphlet to also act as an application form. The Janet Leffack scholarship, for professional development was established. The Young Artist Competition was held in April.

President: Marjorie Foxall

1997

Membership stands at 127. Janet Leffack is made a life member. "Arabesque", our provincial newsletter provides a direct link to our members.

The NSRMTA Trophy was donated by Lorna Wanzel to the NS Kiwanis Music festival for a student, son or daughter, of a member of the Halifax Chapter RMT. A prize of \$50.00 was donated by the Halifax Chapter of NSRMTA, which accompanied the trophy.

1998

President Lorna Wanzel.

Membership stands at 120 – 121.

This year's Provincial convention featured Dr. Janet Hammock discussing Keyboard Ornamentation with special emphasis on the music of JS Bach.

The New President for 1998-99 was Christine McClearn

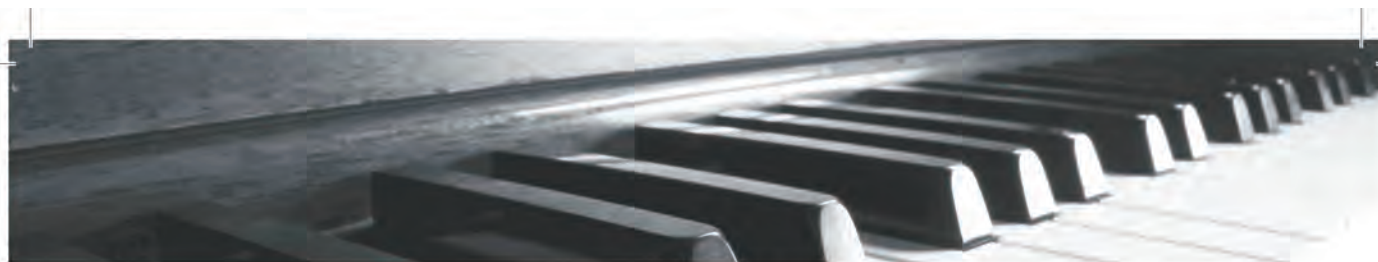

PEIRMTA HISTORY FROM OUR BEGINNING TO SPRING 2010

Prior to 1995, Prince Edward Island was the only province in Canada in which no official association for independent music teachers existed. There had been previous attempts to organize a Prince Edward Island Registered Music Teachers' Association, but without success. With the arrival of Jennifer King, who was an active member with the Nova Scotia Registered Music Teachers' Association, and a visit by Carol Mellors to Charlottetown (arranged by Jennifer and Michal King), interest in forming a provincial body grew. The Canadian Federation of Music Teachers' Associations supported, both in spirit and dollars, this enormous undertaking.

The next step involved Jennifer King, Veronica Materi, Sebastian Derry, and Nicole Bélécque meeting many times to discuss by-laws. With guidance from material received from other provinces, and additional music educators, by-laws were discussed and decisions finalized. Various meetings were held and these decisions were presented to music teachers from across the province. The by-laws were accepted, and an executive was elected. The Prince Edward Island Registered Music Teachers' Association was formed. Our first President was Veronica Materi.

The PEIRMTA was incorporated as a non profit group on April 19, 1995, Incorporation Number 9060. Our seal was received on May 11, 1995 and we became an Official Member of CFMTA in July 1995. Our winning logo was designed by Richard McGraw.

We currently have 31 members (as of February 2010).

Firsts:

- Our first Directory in 1995 contained 23 names.
- Our first opportunity to host a CFMTA Atlantic Young Artist Tour was in October 1995 for pianist David Sharpe. We have since hosted Measha Gosman in 1997 (now a famous operatic star); Lynn Kuo, violin, in 1999; Marc Djokic, violin, in 2001 (also now well known); Patrick Cashin, piano, 2003; Philip Roberts, piano, 2006; and Michael Thibodeau, piano, 2008.
- Our monthly Young Musicians Recital Series was established in November 1995. We also had get-togethers for adult students and teachers 3 times per year (now twice).
- March 1996 saw our first Pedagogy meeting.
- In Spring 2006 we were privileged to host a Piano Six visit and recital by Janina Fialkowska, and, in November 1998, another Marc- André Hamelin. Janina revisited us after she had recovered from an operation to remove a cancerous tumor from her arm. Masterclasses and school performances also took place during the visits.
- The PEIRMTA's first anniversary was celebrated with a Cabaret fundraiser to enable us to offer Music Festival awards. The "Loonie Tunes Cabaret" became

a regular event, but was eventually replaced by our annual Perform-a-thon. Our 5th Anniversary was celebrated by going out to dinner together. Of course we finished off a cake afterward. Our 10th Anniversary celebration took the form of a full day Convention in August 2005, at which we enjoyed four workshops and a luncheon that included an Anniversary cake. A committee is in place to plan a Fall 2010 concert and reception (with cake!) in honour of our 15th Anniversary and CFMTA's 75th. We hope to have some of the original and former Members present and to read greetings from others unable to attend. The concert will feature the numbers 15 and 75 in various ways and it is hoped that the performers will include some of our former Members and students. The concert will be open to the general public.

- November 1997 was the first year for our Canada Music Week[®] Competition, at that time not only for Music Writing but also for Posters and Essays (now only for compositions). In Fall 2002, we had our first national composition winner, Qeturah Tersteeg, in Class B1, followed in 2003 by Kailea Switzer, who came second in Class B2.
- The PEIRMTA hosted the CFMTA Annual Meetings in Charlottetown, July 12-14, 2002.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND REGISTERED MUSIC TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION HISTORY

- In 2005, we held our first Provincial Competition to choose competitors for the national CFMTA Piano Competition (Sarah Russell) and Rosza Foundation Voice Competition (Lindsay Michael).
- Our website (www.peirmta.ca) was launched in September 2006. The website was designed by and continues to be maintained voluntarily by member Kay Linkletter.
- In Fall 2006 the PEIRMTA participated in CFMTA's new initiative for The Canadian Music Teacher magazine: "Presenting Canadian Composers from Coast to Coast". Bert Tersteeg was our first submission, followed in successive years by Dr. Jim Dickson, Jennifer Barrett-Drew, and Dr. Richard Gibson.
- Louise Pritchard became our first Life Member in Fall 2007. Currently 86 years of age, she continues to teach successfully.
- In November 2007, students of PEIRMTA teachers participated in the first CFMTA Cross-Canada Performance in honour of Canada Music Week®. Haley Doherty, accompanied by Jacqueline Sorensen, performed Ernst Schneider's Lullaby of the Iroquois and Echo Lau performed Lilian Safdie's piano piece, Dance of the Loons.
- In 2008, members John and Jen Clement celebrated the 30th Anniversary of their group, the Singing Strings, and were featured

in the Winter 2008 edition of the CMT magazine.

- On April 11, 2008, the PEIRMTA organized PEI's participation in a National Day of Action Demonstration against cuts to CBC Radio 2 and the CBC Orchestra.
- In March 2009, member Annabel Cohen received funding for her international AIRS project (Advancing Interdisciplinary Research in Singing), in which PEIRMTA and CFMTA are Stakeholders.
- On November 9, 2009, member Jacqueline Sorensen was named one of 50 Canadian Music Centre Ambassadors at the CMC's 50th Anniversary at the National Arts Centre for her exceptional role in shaping the Canadian music scene and raising the profile of Canadian music.

In addition to the projects mentioned above, we arrange as many workshops as possible for the continuing education for our members and students. We are currently offering the second year of an Olympic Challenge for technique and are looking into starting a research group.

Our presidents have been: Veronica Materi (1 year), Jacqueline Sorensen (6 years), Suzanne Campbell (3 years), (we survived 1 year without a president), and Jane Naylor (4 years).

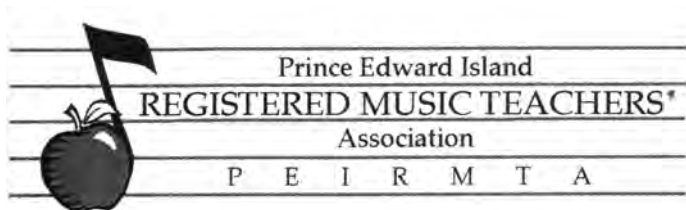

MANITOBA REGISTERED MUSIC TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION HISTORY

MRMTA membership numbers have remained relatively stable for many years. Unfortunately the Portage La Prairie Branch folded in 1993, but its members have continued to be associated with MRMTA as Independent Members.

In 1996 MRMTA was awarded the 'Prix Manitoba' prize in Arts for 'Distinguished Service, Volunteer Organization'. A beautiful print of 'Grey Owl' was presented to the organization at that time, and ever since, the print has been presented to each incoming President to keep in their home for their term in office.

MRMTA member Virginia Heinrichs was elected CFMTA President at the Saskatoon Convention in 1995. In July 1999 MRMTA hosted the CFMTA Convention in Winnipeg, "Music – The Next Millennium", which included several workshops, a String competition as well as the Piano competition, and a concert by our guest artist, pianist Jon Kimura Parker.

In 2004 MRMTA celebrated its 85th Anniversary with a Gala event following the Annual General meeting in October. CFMTA President Victoria Warwick was in attendance, as was long time member Irene Rowlin who was honoured on the occasion of her 99th birthday. She invited us all to her 100th birthday party in a year's time, and many of our members attended that party. (Irene celebrated her 104th birthday in October of 2009!)

Canada Music Week of 2005 saw a special celebration by Winnipeg Branch. A work was commissioned from local composer David Scott, and "Four Bagatelles" for euphonium and piano was performed at the Canada Music Week by U of M music student Vanessa

Nowostawski. Canada Music Week® continues to be celebrated by our members across the province, with various recitals, workshops, and other activities. The Music Writing competition is also very popular with our teachers, and their students have submitted many winning compositions over the years.

In August 2006 a celebration of 'One Hundred Years of Music at Brandon University' was held, with over 300 alumni and guests attending the reunion. Performances were given by current and former students and professors throughout the 3 day affair. Brandon University School of Music continues to be well respected across the country and abroad, with many MRMTA members on their faculty.

The most recent Western Young Artist winner from Manitoba was pianist Michelle Price, a graduate of Brandon University, who toured Manitoba and Saskatchewan in the fall of 2008. Manitoba has continued to support the Young Artist Series over the years, and several of its winners have gone on to international careers in music.

In 2008 the University of Manitoba School of Music became the Marcel A. Desautels Faculty of Music, receiving a \$20 million donation from its namesake for its programs. The Bachelor of Jazz Studies program was added to its curriculum, which also saw the addition of several Master of Music programs in the last decade. Another well known and respected music institution, U of M has many MRMTA members on its faculty, including such performing artists as pianist David Moroz and singer Tracy Dahl.

Also in 2008, MRMTA adopted the policy of requiring all its active Full,

Interim and Student Members to complete a Child Abuse Registry or Criminal Check (Vulnerable Sector). At present the renewal of this check is every 5 years.

The annual Pianothon/Musicthon celebrated its 20th year in 2009, thanks to the efforts and dedication of coordinator Marje Lebrun. Over the years funds in excess of \$155,000 have been raised for Variety Club Special Arts Programs, music programs in subsidized daycares and various music therapy programs.

The Brandon Branch recently changed its name to Brandon and Westman Branch, to more accurately reflect the location of its members. While many of the Brandon Branch members are associated with Brandon University, there is a very active group of teachers in the smaller communities south and west of Brandon. These teachers form a large part of the Branch membership and contribute so much to the cultural life of their respective communities, as well as support each other through combined workshops and recitals.

In October 2009 another Gala celebration was held, this time to celebrate the 90th anniversary of MRMTA. Remi Bouchard's commissioned work for the occasion, entitled 'Piece de Concert' Op. 569, was performed by pianist Evan Hopfner from Brandon University. CFMTA President Darlene Brigedear was in attendance, as were many long time members of our Association to whom we owe a great deal of gratitude for their contributions to MRMTA over the years. Honourary Life Memberships were also presented to Virginia Heinrichs from Winnipeg and Dr. Ken Nichols from Brandon.

MRMTA was saddened by the recent deaths of two of our long time members, both well known and well respected teachers in our province and across Canada – Jean Broadfoot in June of 2009 and Dr. Lorne Watson in January 2010. Their contributions to music education in Manitoba and beyond will always be remembered.

Our Association is currently looking at some possible reorganization in order to operate its current programs in a more efficient manner. However, our members' dedication to providing high calibre music instruction in our province will continue with the same fervour as it did 90 years ago, ensuring a bright future for MRMTA.

BRITISH COLUMBIA REGISTERED MUSIC TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION HISTORY

In 1932, the BC Music Teacher's Federation was officially founded by amalgamating teacher's groups in Victoria and Vancouver. The organization grew and in 1947 an Act was passed in the BC Legislature allowing us to officially become the BC Registered Music Teachers' Association.

With currently over 1000 members and 21 branches across our province, the BC Registered Music Teachers' Association is a driving musical force in British Columbia. Our individual branches sponsor music festivals, teacher workshops, recitals and music composition opportunities. The branches are the focal points for their communities in the celebration of Canada Music Week. We proudly offer 25 and 50 year membership pins, support professional development through workshop grants and offer competition and performance opportunities to the students of our members through our BC Piano Competition and Young Artist Tour. Our Conventions provide an opportunity to experience dazzling performances, stimulating workshops and wonderful opportunities for socializing with our colleagues from across the province. We are especially rewarded with the knowledge that our BC Piano Competition has been a starting place for many young performers who so ably represented us at the CFMTA National Piano Competition over the years.

BCRMTA History Update: 1995 to 2010

In 1995, BCRMTA was busy moving into the computer age. Our membership records were put into a more accessible format thanks to our Registrar, Susan Olsen. We published our Provincial Guidelines brochure, which indicated the individual teacher's responsibility to

the association, the community and colleagues. The Victoria Branch celebrated its 65th anniversary in June with a luncheon and achievement concert. The highlight was the presentation of BCRMTA Honorary Life Memberships to both Dr. Robin Wood and Winifred Scott Wood.

"Encore 96" was the perfect name for our 1996 convention sponsored by Surrey, North Delta Branch as again it featured our native son, Jon Kimura Parker. He gave us a stunning recital followed by inspiring masterclasses. A huge gain for music students in BC came with the High School Accreditation policies finalized by the Ministry of Education with input from BCRMTA. New permanent committees were struck within BCRMTA for Finance, Awards and Professional Development.

On September 20, 1997, BC Registered Music Teachers' Association celebrated its 50th anniversary. The gala dinner and ceremony began with honouring the seven charter members who joined us in 1947 and who still retained their membership. The evening ended with a performance of the hilarious "Two Pianos and Four Hands". During this year, the Coquitlam/Maple Ridge Branch held a very successful Artistic Retreat at Whistler, BC and Jean Grieve was elected our new President. The Penticton Branch hosted the BCRMTA 1998 workshop. The great Canadian pianist, Angela Hewitt, presented an exciting recital to a capacity crowd and also conducted two inspiring masterclasses. Ernst Schneider, long-standing executive member of BCRMTA and CFMTA was presented with a BCRMTA Honorary Life Membership.

In 1999, the BC Provincial Council revised and clarified its various Membership categories to include the Student Teacher Auxiliary. We expanded our Professional Development area with the addition of Clinicians lists and establishment of a Video Resource Library available to all members.

We mourned the passing of two BC composers in 2000, Jean Coulthard and Barbara Pentland. Each contributed greatly to Canadian music and to our international reputation. The Cariboo Branch was the first to receive the newly established Professional Development workshop bursary created to give outlying branches access to workshops and clinicians that they could otherwise not afford. Our new website, created by Carol Schlosar, was unveiled.

The 2001 CFMTA Convention "A Musical Odyssey" was held in Kelowna, coordinated by Carol Shinkewski and her committee. There was tremendous support from all across Canada, as this was the first CFMTA convention in BC since 1985. Carol Shinkewski was awarded a BCRMTA Honorary Life Membership at the gala banquet, which featured an inspiring and heartwarming presentation by Alvin Law. The Provincial Council accepted a proposal by the Victoria Branch to make available a Musical Community Service Award (bronze-10 hours, silver-35 hours, and gold- 60 hours) to encourage students to be more musically involved in the community. We welcomed our new President, Lynne Carmichael.

BRITISH COLUMBIA REGISTERED MUSIC TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION HISTORY

In 2002, the Provincial Convention was held in Nanaimo, hosted by the Mid-Island Branch committee headed by Gloria Venning. They won our hearts with Nanaimo bars and the Branch song contest! The internationally-known Nelita True treated us to a fabulous concert. Her energy flowing, she enhanced our experience with lectures and masterclasses that reflected her dedicated teaching career.

The call "Come to the Sea in 2003" was heeded by seventeen of our BCRMTA members who thoroughly enjoyed the legendary Newfoundland hospitality. The Clinicians List and Video Library catalogue were added to the website as well as the Teacher Directory, listing each teacher by branch and discipline.

In 2004 we were saddened by the death of several members – Gladys Smillie (Victoria), Dr. Gloria Venning (Mid-Island), and Dr. Robin Wood (Victoria). Dr. Wood will long be remembered. Not only for his tremendous support of the Victoria Branch, but for the musical encouragement and wisdom which he shared with teachers and students throughout the province and elsewhere. The 2004 Provincial Convention, hosted by the North Shore Branch on the shores of Burrard Inlet, was organized by Joyce Jackson and her committee. The wonderful Jane Coop gave masterclasses and treated our ears to a beautiful recital.

In 2005 Ernst Schneider, our Provincial Treasurer and Newsletter Editor retired from his work with BCRMTA. He served our organization for over 40 years in many capacities- as BC President, CF Delegate and CFMTA President. Ernst's Treasurer position was smoothly assumed by Lois Kerr. This was the final year of our Variety Club Project (to which BCRMTA

members and friends contributed nearly \$35,000 over three years) and a community "Sunshine" van now bears our name. The Victoria Branch celebrated its 75th anniversary in May with over 100 people attended a High Tea Lunch featuring a unique musical celebration, coordinated by Wendy Maggiora. All of the works presented were composed by branch members as far back as the 1930s. In 2005, we welcomed our new President, Darlene Brigidear.

2006 was the birth centenary of Dr. Murray Adaskin, stellar composer, conductor, arts administrator, BCRMTA Honorary Life Member, beloved teacher and mentor. Three musical organizations - the Victoria Piano Summer School, the Canadian Music Centre (BC Regional Office), and the BCRMTA worked together to purchase Mr. Adaskin's beloved grand piano. It was restored and placed at the Canadian Music Centre in Vancouver. The BCRMTA coordinated a CD "Robin Remembered" honoring the performance career of the late Dr. Robin Wood. BCRMTA celebrated its 60TH anniversary in 2007 with a gala banquet in Richmond that included an introduction of Past Presidents, Honorary Life Members and the conferring of Lynne Carmichael as the newest BCRMTA Honorary Life Member. Coordinated by Ildiko Skeldon-Huber and her committee, this special celebration concluded with a fabulous concert by the Canadian piano duo, James Anagnoson and Leslie Kinton. Our own Ernst Schneider had his composition chosen for the

"simultaneous across-Canada" CF Canada Music Week Project.

In 2008 our provincial magazine, edited by Dina Pollock, was renamed Progressions. "Rejuvenate 2008" was the theme for our Provincial Convention held in the beautiful Harrison Hot Springs Resort and so ably coordinated by Irmi Teichrob and her committee. Guest pianist, Stéphane Lemelin gave a recital and workshops during the weekend and Terry Small gave us new insight into the musical brain! Our updated website was completed. Our Canada Music Week events, overseen by the enthusiastic Cindy Taylor, resulted in a special result for our North Shore Branch – the inaugural Bill Andrews Award for their unique Canada Music Week project.

2009 brought the return of sponsoring the BC Young Artist Tour and our winner was featured in a multi-community tour coordinated by Susan Schleppe. The South Fraser Branch was the winner of the Bill Andrews Award for their David Duke Canada Music Week® project. The Victoria branch sponsored a successful nomination for the Hugheen Ferguson Distinguished Teacher Award and it was most deservedly presented to Winifred Scott Wood.

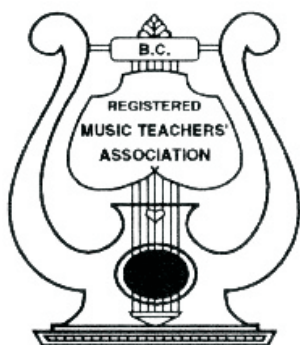

SASKATCHEWAN REGISTERED MUSIC TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION HISTORY

HISTORY OF SRMTA 1985 - 2010

Our professional organization had its beginnings in the 1930s, and was formally recognized in the "Registered Music Teachers Act", passed by the Province of Saskatchewan in 1938.

To quote Margaret Kippen (from her history of the organization written for CFMTA in 1985) "the SRMTA was not only an idea – but an ideal – an ideal conceived with a definite purpose, and its history is the story of the manner in which the teachers have striven to uphold this purpose and speak as a unified body. Among those ideals were the cooperation of teachers to further the advancement of music, and to maintain a high standard of music teaching".

As I write the history continuing from 1985 until 2010, I reflect on how those ideals continue to be met.

One of the reasons the organization has continued to work well is that we combined the positions of registrar, treasurer, and secretary. These tasks are performed by one person who is paid an honorarium. We were fortunate to have that position filled by Lois Bruce from well before 1985 until 1990, and by Penny Joynt from 1990 until 2008. This continuity in guiding provincial presidents and executives over the years has been very beneficial to our provincial group. We sincerely thank these two women who are members of our organization and were active teachers as they performed their provincial duties.

Saskatchewan has 9 branches and has a membership from Buffalo Narrows in the northwest to Weyburn in the southeast part of the province – a distance of close to 900 kilometres!

Our provincial journal "The Opus" has helped us meet the challenges of these great distances.

We want to thank the following editors (again from 1985 until the present time) who were also active teaching members: Janet McGonigle, Lore Ruchienskey, (who updated the look of our journal, arranged to have advertising, and went onto also edit the CFMTA Journal), and our present editor Greg Chase who has taken us into the 21st Century with creation of an 'e-journal' and our web site (www.srmta.com). As well as providing information to our teachers, this also shows our aims and objectives and provides a membership list to the public.

We are also fortunate to work with other music organizations within the province. Many of our members adjudicate with the SMFA (Saskatchewan Music Festival Association) and have served as executive members of this organization at the local, provincial and national level. "The Festival Focus" journal has been part of our Opus journal for several years. And we are all members of our umbrella group the SMEA (Saskatchewan Music Educators Association) which gives advice and guidance to all music teachers within the province (school and private teachers) as well as administering grants for furthering education.

Biennial conventions are held, alternating between Regina and Saskatoon, with annual meetings and workshops in other communities in the off year. Saskatoon would like to encourage everyone to attend this year's convention October 15 and 16 to hear young piano sensation Jan Lisieki perform works by Chopin. The conference theme is "Chopin at 200"

and will also feature noted clinician Dr. Jennifer Snow.

Saskatchewan has hosted four CFMTA conventions – 1939, 1965, 1979, and 1995. We are currently busy preparing for the 2011 Convention "Music as a Life Force", to be held in Regina.

When I look back at our history I am amazed that Saskatchewan hosted the 1939 convention at the end of the "Dirty Thirties", a period which was particularly hard on this province. The fact that our founders considered hosting this prestigious conference in Saskatoon in the newly built Bessborough Hotel – one of the CNR hotels and our 'castle on the river', shows their vision and optimism at this difficult time (notice the picture of delegates at this convention in hostess Madame Sherry's garden). Many of the attendees later visited Waskesiu Lake, located within Prince Albert National Park (218 kilometres north of Saskatoon) – a place made famous by the legendary "Grey Owl".

The Bessborough was also the location of the 1995 conference. This was very successful, led by Sheila Shinkewski and Marilyn Whitehead with the theme of "Visit the Heart of Saskatchewan's Old Northwest". It featured Janina Fialkowska among other clinicians and performers. We all dressed up in period costume to visit the Western Development Museum and posed seriously for an early-style portrait. The National Piano competition had to compete with sounds of the Prairieland Exhibition Parade, complete with a Caliope, wafting through the windows.

In 2005, our province's centennial we published "From Prairie to Pine" a book of piano solos composed by Saskatchewan composers. Our past president Peggy L'Hoir (a recent past president of CFMTA) had this wonderful idea to commemorate our centennial, celebrate our composers and be a resource to our students. Book Two is in the works, again under Peggy's leadership. We also produced two cookbooks, "Cooking Con Brio" and "Cooking Con Brio – Opus Two", which have proven to be lots of fun as well as being profitable fundraisers.

Of course every organization if it continues to grow is constantly updating its by-laws. This was done in 2002 when the "Saskatchewan Registered Music Teachers Act" was updated and renewed by the Saskatchewan Legislature. This was a special time as many of our executive members were present in the legislature to hear its reading and enactment. This reconfirmed our professional status. The present executive is again working on by-laws.

Department of Education recognition of our student's musical accomplishments as credits towards Senior Matriculation (from high school) was first accomplished on behalf of our members in the 1960s. We again had to "lead the charge" in 1996 to keep this designation as the Department felt they should no longer recognize these qualifications. After many letters were written by our teachers, branches, our provincial organization, our students and their parents, the Department relented. The importance of our professional status was further reaffirmed by proclamation of the legislation referred to above.

In 1993 we passed a motion requiring new members to show "proof of pedagogy training" as we realized that knowing how to teach was as important as achieving high level qualifications in proficiency. We recognized "Pre-diploma Status" in 1999 and this eventually led to "Affiliate Level One and Level Two" as advised by CFMTA.

Many scholarships and competitions are provided by our organization, including those donated in memory of our deceased teachers such as Florence Bowes, Lyell Gustin, Gordon Wallace, Jean McCulloch, and Dorothy Bee. We are grateful to the estates, families, and former students of these teachers for making these available to our students. The Music Writing Competition (sponsored by Prairie Malt Ltd., Biggar, Saskatchewan), and the SRMTA Community Service Awards are more recent additions.

We continue to support CFMTA initiatives such as the Young Artist Competition and Tour, and Canada Music Week®. Most branches hold CMW activities and many branches sponsor a Contemporary Showcase.

We have many successful composers in our midst and several teachers have arranged workshops with their students performing one of the composers' works and then working with that composer.

As I look back, I realize how many mentors and leaders have passed away since 1985. I will mention two of our founders – Lyell Gustin, and Edith Nash, but there are many others. As Margaret Kippen (also gone) said in her 1985 history "Leaders will be there at the opportune time" and this has been the case. We thank the many teachers who have given their time and talent to SRMTA and to CFMTA – too numerous to mention, and we can safely say the aims and goals of our original founders have and continues to be achieved.

The NLRMTA, with the support of CBC radio producer Francesca Swann, has celebrated Canada Music Week since 1996 with a recorded program of young musicians performing works of Canadian composers. A fitting addition to this program was initiated in 1999, with composer Boris Berlin in Toronto linked by radio to CBC St. John's, in an interview and commentary on the performances of his music by young students.

Food Bank Recital Series

In 1996, the Food Bank Recital Series began with the help of Martha Couch. It has become an annual event of the NLRMTA as we collectively endeavour to make a tangible contribution to the community. 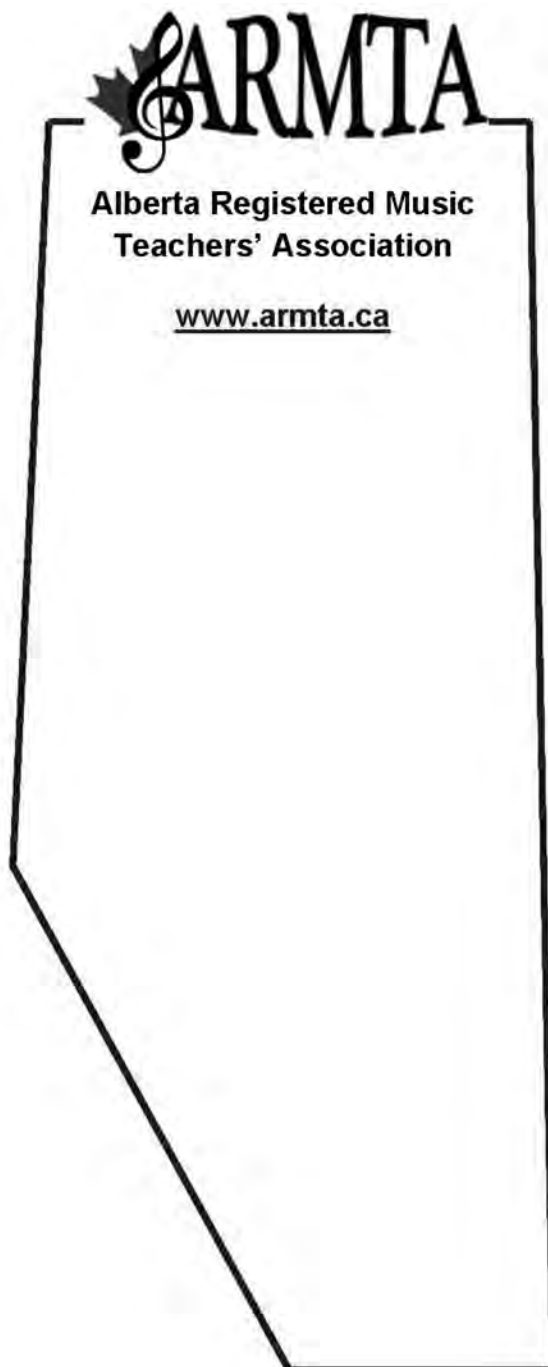
We salute our past with special gratitude to the members who have served ARMTA with extraordinary dedication.

Perhaps we could have our national President visit the provinces; she could speak with the members and hear what their aspirations and needs are. Communicating with other instrumental teachers is important. At present we are represented at national and international events and conferences at which CFMTA is raising awareness of our organization and communicating with other music educators to raise the profile of our profession. Because of the hard work and efforts of your officers, CFMTA is becoming more of a known entity among music educators. This bodes well for our future. Bridges are being built which will benefit all our members.

Wouldn't it be great if we could conduct more research, whether this would be market research or education research? Building knowledge together is one of my dreams. As music teachers, we have been in the knowledge teaching business for a long time. We learn so much from one another and our students. But as they say, "times are a-changing" and we need to keep up with them. Technology has given us so many advantages.

Wouldn't it be great if we could take advantage of new programmes to assist our teachers and provide them with important data and more information? Making our website an integral tool for all music teachers to share information and feel a part of CFMTA is vital, but we could do even more with new technological advances.

Wouldn't it be great if we could meet more than once a year via web cam with online meetings?
Wouldn't it be great if our Canadian Music Teacher magazine became more of a journal reporting on current research, events and ideas? We could have an editorial board with representation from across the country and across different disciplines in music education. Perhaps our 'journal' could go electronic and then we wouldn't have to worry about publishing only a limited number of pages because of the cost of postage. Some of our provinces have already done this very successfully.
