HELPFUL HINTS AND TIPS

In light of the evolving situation regarding COVID-19, you may wish to consider the following tips for your studios. Thank you to ORMTA and BCRMTA for their contributions.

- Stay informed. Visit the Canadian Centre For Disease Control website at: https://www.canada.ca/en/public-health.html
- Visit the website of your local health authority for further details and updates for your area.
- Students should wash their hands as soon as they arrive in the studio.
- As a precaution, wipe down/disinfect surfaces (piano keys, pencils, pens, music stands, music books, etc.) between students.
- If students are experiencing any symptoms of cold or flu (sneezing, coughing, runny nose, fever, sick stomachs, etc.) they should not attend their lesson.
- If the student is well enough to have an online lesson during their regular lesson time and is staying home out of caution, set up a Facetime, Skype or other online meeting.
- If a student arrives sick, do not teach the lesson and call parents to pick them up.
